A Surprise Scripture Lesson

In October we went to visit our daughter in Yorkshire. She had arranged for us to go to the Crucible Theatre in Sheffield to see a captioned performance of "A Doll's House" by Ibsen. Three of us out of five were hard-of-hearing and wear hearing aids. We returned home on the Sunday morning down the M1 and



took a short detour to Hardwick Hall, a National Trust property, feeling vaguely guilty for nor going to church. The display in the main hall was of tapestries returned this year from

being conserved. There was an explanation and video of the process that took over 24 years. There are 13 tapestries altogether, each approximately 7 *metres* by 6 *metres*, telling the story of Gideon from Judges chapter 6 and following. Gideon himself is depicted as wearing Tudor garments, looking the same on every tapestry.

The one I am remembering is the one where Gideon takes the

men down to the water where God chooses just 300 men (Judges chapter 7 verse 6) from the original 32,000 (Judges chapter 7 verse 3). So, I remember this when I am sometimes concerned about the low numbers in the congregation. The tapestries



were commissioned in 1578 by Sir Christopher Hatton, an Elizabethan courtier, and bought by Elizabeth of Hardwick in 1592. *To see more search online for "Gideon Tapestries"*.

The title of this piece comes from a Christmas song that we used to teach our infants to sing and they would sound like little angels as they presented their nativity play to their parents. There would not be a dry eye in the house and the children would always seem proud of what they had achieved. I wish I could remember all the words but it was a long time



ago. It talks of the wise men arriving and being asked to come in very softly because the little King may be sleeping.

Taking young children into the real story of Christmas was always a joy to me when I was teaching. One year we took a group of 5 and 6 year olds to an adult nativity presentation at Whipsnade Zoo. The zoo created a Nativity play within a stable

setting so the children were sitting in the stable in Bethlehem watching as Mary and Joseph arrived. Jesus was put in the manger. Shepherds and magi visitors came to worship Jesus bringing their sheep and camels with them. The donkey munched on hay in the stall at the side of the stable and the children were asked if they would like to be included in the play. As you can imagine many of them jumped at the opportunity and were given costumes and led down the steps of the seating towards the manger. They stood in awe as if they were actually present in Bethlehem. It was wonderful.

I am hoping it was an experience that they will always have in the storage of memory down through the years. Those children will be well in their 40s by now but I pray they revisit Bethlehem every Christmas in their rememberings.

I wonder how big Bethlehem was at the time of Jesus' birth. The wise men are shown exactly where to find Jesus because the star shone right over the stable but the shepherds are told to go and search for Him, they are given a few clues..... stable, manger, swaddling clothes etc but there must have been more than one stable in Bethlehem that night. Maybe the stables were all in the same area of town and they just went along until they found the family. The fact that they found Him means they were really searching.

I suppose they knew Bethlehem quite well as it was the town they were nearest to up in the hills. They were probably from Bethlehem or at least had lived there for a while so they had a bit of an idea where to look. I also wonder if there was a leader who organised the search or whether they



all decided what to do. The fact that they left their sheep and raced down to Bethlehem seems to indicate that this was something they had longed for and dared not think they would ever see. [A bit like England winning the World Cup in 1966 but far more important!!!!] When they got back, I wonder who they told first. When the Samaritan woman returned to her village after meeting with Jesus, she told everyone she met. Did the shepherds tell all their friends and suggest they go and see the Messiah? Of course, Jesus didn't stay in Bethlehem, it was the place where He first arrived. But that was where everything changed forever. It's a place to rejoice about.

To you in David's town this day is born of David's line The Saviour who is Christ the Lord and this shall be the sign The heavenly babe you there shall find to human view displayed All meanly wrapped in swaddling bands and in a manger laid.



Who was Herod the Great?

The last book of the Old Testament is Malachi. After that, the Bible falls silent until the time of Jesus as recorded in the Gospels. However, we know something of the history of Judea between the time of Malachi and the Gospels. For about one hundred years, the Persians controlled Judea but the Jews were allowed to carry on their religious observances and were not interfered with. During this time Judea was ruled by the high priests who were responsible for Jewish government.



In 333BC the Persian armies stationed in Macedonia were defeated by Alexander the Great. Although Alexander permitted the Jews to observe their own laws, he believed that Greek culture should be adopted by everyone. As a consequence, in about 250BC, the Old Testament was translated into Greek. This was known as the Septuagint and became the version used by most Jews outside of Judea. After Alexander's death, Judea was first ruled by the Ptolemies in a benevolent manner. When this gave way to the rule of the Seleucids, the Jews were greatly oppressed. Led by Judas the Maccabee, the Jews revolted and took control of Judea.



In the year 63BC Pompey, the Roman general, captured Jerusalem and the provinces of Palestine became subject to Rome. The taking of Jerusalem began with a three-month siege of the temple area, massacring priests in the performance of their duties and entering the most holy place. This sacrilege began Roman rule in a way that Jews could not forgive nor forget.



The local government of Palestine was entrusted partly to princes and the rest of the time to procurators appointed by the emperors. Herod I, also known as Herod the Great, was appointed by the Romans as king of Palestine in 37BC. He is the Herod described in the Bible as king at the time of Jesus' birth. Herod had been born in 72BC in Edom and, although an Arab, had been raised as a Jew. Although he wanted to be known as King of the Jews, the Jews would never accept him as such.



A lot of what modern people know regarding the birth of Jesus has been gleaned from watching children's nativities. As a result, Herod is often

viewed merely as a pantomime villain. He ruled Palestine for a long time, was a survivor in the often-turbulent world of Roman politics and was a complex character mixing many achievements with paranoia resulting in great cruelty.



Only two of the Gospels give any details of Jesus' birth and these are like two parts which construct the whole story. Luke tells us about Mary, the Roman census, the angels, the shepherds and the presentation of the baby Jesus at the temple in Jerusalem. Matthew concentrates on Joseph, the Magi and Herod. After Jesus was born in Bethlehem, Magi from the east came to Jerusalem and asked "Where is the one who has been born King of the Jews?" Herod sends them to find the child and report to him. When Herod realises that he has been outwitted by the Magi, he gives orders to kill all the boys in Bethlehem and its vicinity who are two years old and under.



There are historians who dispute the authenticity of this. This may be because the historian Josephus does not mention the massacre of the innocents. Josephus does however record many of Herod's misdeeds including the execution of three of his own sons, two wives and his mother-in-law when he suspects them of conspiracy. It seems certain that a man capable of killing members of his own family would have no qualms about killing other people's children to prevent a threat to his power.



So, there we have Herod the Great; achiever, paranoid, survivor, murderer. As complex a character to ever appear in Greek myth, Roman politics or Shakespearian tragedy.

It is important we have a clear understanding of the facts about our world, far too much misinformation or outright lies give us a false view of the problems faced by our leaders, and more importantly what we can do to make a difference.

If you get hooked and want to learn more about population, poverty, education, food or health there are further quizzes to entertain and enlighten. Be warned there are over 1000 follow up questions you can try! I have done 4 of these, very enlightening as there are links to where the data comes from so that you can check the sources of the data used. I would encourage you to give the quiz a go - only takes 10 minutes (unless you get hooked and start following the background to the question or start doing some of the follow up quizzes)




